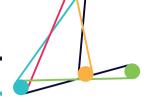
Active Communities

CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES

Charitable activities

Using an asset-based approach, empower Renfrewshire communities to deliver sustainable health outcomes

We supported local people through peer-led, preventative and community-based approaches:

Our 59 Community Health Champions played a vital role in delivering our work. Together, they contributed over 5,200 volunteer hours and engaged more than 3,800 people across Renfrewshire. Champions supported walking groups, drop-ins, intergenerational sessions and events such as the Feel Good Festival, Burns Supper and Jingle Bell Run. Our telephone befrienders made over 740 supportive calls and messages to isolated individuals. Volunteers also completed 300+ hours of training in mental health, inclusive volunteering, and first aid.



HEARTY LIVES

Hearty Lives is our ambitious and innovative partnership project which delivers a peer-led approach to promoting mental health and wellbeing across all Renfrewshire High Schools. The project is managed by Active Communities but delivered by teachers and pupils in Renfrewshire High Schools. It's funded by Renfrewshire Council. It is a unique partnership which promotes mental health and wellbeing for young people in Renfrewshire and aims to tackle poverty through a peer education approach, focused on tackling inequalities



and improving health. Key issues being addressed by the project include: bullying, exam stress, worry, anxiety, self-care. resilience, and promoting positive mental health. This year, we continued to deliver Hearty Lives in schools and in community settings-training young people as volunteer peer educators on topics they chose, including vaping, tobacco and mental wellbeing.





We also supported weekly youth provision, including a drop-in at Linwood High, an after-school drop in at Station Seven, the Create youth club for S1+ pupils and Games and Grub for p5-p7 pupils. Create Club and Games and Grub are delivered in partnership with Create Paisley.

EMPOWERING PARENTS, EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES

Empowering Parents, Empowering Communities (EPEC) in partnership with KLAS Care and Renfrewshire Council's Family Wellbeing Team. EPEC is a peer-led parenting programme that builds confidence, practical skills, and strong support networks. This year, 129 families attended our Being a Parent and Being a Parent of a Child with Autism courses. We ran 10 ten-week programmes across Renfrewshire-including Paisley, Erskine, Linwood, Gallowhill, Lochwinnoch, Elderslie, Ferguslie, and online-led by trained volunteer parents supported by Renfrewshire trainers Lesley Compston, Cheryl Thomas, and Susanne McNeil. We also delivered a 12-week Parent. Group Leader training course at UWS, with 9 parents completing the programme and 4 submitting learning journals to the national EPEC team in London for validation.



JOGGING AND WALKING PROGRAMMES

Our jogging and walking programmes helped people stay active and connected across Renfrewshire, with **967** attendances at Jogging Buddies and **800** at our Walk & Talk group. We also celebrated the 20th Anniversary of our Jingle Bell Run in Barshaw Park, Paisley, bringing together hundreds of runners, families and volunteers for a festive day of community spirit.





We reached new communities, including refugees and asylum seekers, through our partnership with the Resettlement Team.

We offered pantry vouchers, panto tickets, and access to free family events, helping ease pressure on families and create opportunities for connection.

GALLOWHILL

Gallowhill. We were commissioned by the HSCP for a six-month piece of work facilitating a community needs assessment in the community of Gallowhill from July 2024 – January 2025. This took the form of speaking to the community on the streets, hosting events, having anonymous written paper feedback in various community locations, an online questionnaire, speaking to people attending clubs or groups in the area, and speaking to people who work in the area. 1033 responses were submitted as part of this consultation.

The results were compiled into a full report for the HSCP, which will now inform work going forward in the area. We applied for additional funding to allow us to run a soup and social activity for the community from January-March 2025



COMMUNITY PANTRY & ROUND THE TABLE

Our **Community Pantry** continues to be a vital support for local people, with **303** members accessing affordable groceries, toiletries and household items across **2,690** visits this year. Members also benefit from our free weekly breakfast, creating space for connection and early engagement with wider support.

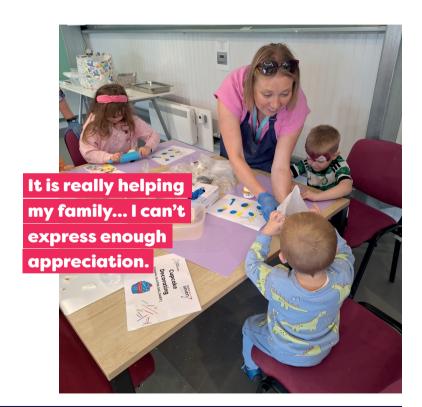
Round the Table builds on this through monthly community meals, cooking courses and family events. Over the year, we supported more than 1,100 people with dignified food provision and opportunities to connect. 50 volunteers gave 2,830 hours to create welcoming, inclusive spaces shaped by Nourish Scotland's Dignity in Practice programme. Participants reported increased confidence, better wellbeing, and a strong sense of community: "I come to the meal with my three children and my mother. It's a monthly family get-together. The kids love it and always enjoy themselves."



THRIVE UNDER FIVE

Building on this foundation. Thrive Under Five supported 43 families with young children through weekly meal kits, fresh produce, pantry access, cooking, and play. In total, we delivered 243 meal kits, 516 pantry shops, and fruit and veg for 75 children. Seventeen families joined cooking sessions, and local providers offered free gymnastics and dance classes. We also made 17 referrals to Citizens Advice and 12 to employability support via INVEST. One parent told us: "It is really helping my family... I can't express enough appreciation." Families described learning new skills, finding community, and being able to give their children experiences who would have previously gone without - from dancing lessons to pancake breakfasts at home. The pilot shaped our wider family support and strengthened local partnerships we will build on in the future

We secured funding from Kew Gardens' Urban Nature Fund to create a green space at Station Seven - supporting local biodiversity, community learning, and wellbeing through access to nature.



YOUR PLACE, YOUR SPACE

As part of our **Your Place, Your Space** project—funded by The
National Lottery Community
Fund-we delivered free,
family-focused activities in Station
Seven to support wellbeing in
response to financial pressures
and the wider challenges families
face. These included arts, dance,
movie afternoons, and Halloween
and Christmas events

We welcomed the **School of African Cultures** to Station Seven as part of our drop-in programme. Their Afro-ttire showcase introduced community members to traditional clothing, music and stories—celebrating the rich diversity within our community.



Health and Wellbeing Activities in Station Seven

We continued to offer a wide range of health and wellbeing activities funded through our **HE.AL.THY** programme (The National Lottery Community Fund): yoga, Pilates, men's health sessions, mindfulness, singing, and community catch-ups. In January, we launched a 12-week Nutrition & Weight Management course led by a personal trainer, covering calorie intake, exercise, and meal planning. In total, we delivered **207** sessions, with **2,040** attendances and over **2,650** hours of contact time.

We also hosted creative activities like knit & knatter, a silent disco at the RASA Wellbeing Day and partnered with 4 Corners Boxing to deliver a free weekly men's fitness session.

We took a bus full of local families on a day trip to Blair Drummond Safari

Park. During Carers Week, we hosted a wellbeing walk in partnership with Renfrewshire Carers Centre.



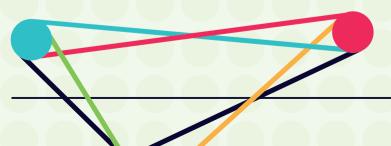
SUSTAINABLE, SAFE AND EFFICIENT



Sustainable, Safe and Efficient

We focused on ensuring our organisation remains well-run, financially sustainable, and aligned with good governance and environmental responsibility:

- Maintained a healthy financial position, with unrestricted income contributing to our reserves.
- We continued to develop Station Seven as a sustainable community asset. Our four Start-Up Street units provided affordable space for local health and wellbeing businesses, supporting enterprise. Within the main building, we continue to host Roar - Connections for Life, who hired office space as part of our wider effort to collaborate with aligned organisations.
- Through our Strengthening Communities project, we progressed work on business development, marketing and income generation to build long-term sustainability and impact.
- Continued to diversify income through hires at Station Seven and tools such as GoodBox contactless donations.
- Strengthened our governance through the expansion of the Finance Subcommittee into the Finance, Audit and Risk (FAR) Committee, with new terms of reference adopted.



SUSTAINABLE, SAFE AND EFFICIENT

- Understanding our environmental impact through Business Energy Scotland and Extend+, completing both an Energy Efficiency Assessment and a Carbon Baseline Report (16.89 tCO2e baseline, with key contributors being electricity and gas). Priority recommendations included exploring solar PV installation and behavioural changes around energy use. As a team, we took part in a community tree-planting day and progressed work towards an EV charging point at Station Seven.
- Received volunteer support from B&Q Paisley through their Community Days programme, helping refurbish our conference room and make Station Seven more welcoming for training and events.
- Improved digital systems by automating rent collection (GoCardless) and embedding Upshot across most active projects, with ongoing internal reviews to improve data and reporting.
